


### Chippewa Runners Compete at State Meet Continued

She certainly did do that this year, giving herself a first team all conference finish and also allowing her to extend her season by competing at the state meet. According to Postma, "Making it to the state meet was my main goal for the season. ### Swim Team Ends the Season With a Splash

The Manistee Girls swim team was small but mighty. Despite ending the season with only five able-bodied swimmers (captain **Maddie Fox (12)** was sidelined with a shoulder injury early in the season), the team swam well at their final conference meet. Manistee was able to beat Fremont – a team with double the number of swimmers – to come in fourth at the meet.





The conference meet was a two day event. The top 16 swimmers in each event on Friday's prelims races got to swim in Saturday's final meet. Every girl on the team continued on to Saturday and medaled in the final meet. Lauren Mezeske (11) led the team in individual finishes by placing third in both the 50 and 100 freestyle. Captain Solana Postma (12) placed 5th in the 200 freestyle and 8th in the 100 freestyle. Laura Eix (10) placed 4th in the 100 breaststroke. Annika Arendt (10) dropped 19 seconds to swim a personal best in the 500 freestyle and placed 6th. The 400 freestyle relay team consisting of Postma, Eix, Arendt, and Tatum Jenson (11) medaled at 3rd.

In reminiscing on the season, Annika Arendt says, "I really enjoyed it and am impressed with the improvement of myself and my teammates over the season." In line with the team's wild humor, when asked for a quote, Lauren Mezeske noted that "Tatum

For the **freshmen** out there, find what you love. You don't have to be the person who does everything from student council to theater to varsity basketball. **Sophomores**, start thinking about college. This is a great time to check out different areas of study. # SpaceX Launch: Up, Up and Away By: Avery Vaas

This Wednesday (Nov. 10, 2021) privately owned company SpaceX once again forged past the atmosphere. The SpaceX company, owned by Elon Musk, launched Crew-3 from NASA's Kennedy Space Center at 9:03 pm ET, where they proceeded to the International Space Station (ISS). They reached the ISS on Thursday morning, as estimated by company and crew. The 4-man crew aboard will now mark 18 astronauts that have been launched by SpaceX. This launch also marked the 3rd, and most recent, addition to operational crew launches for NASA to date. While there were high hopes for



the conditions of the launch, and such were deemed sufficient, this is not the first time Crew-3 was set to enter orbit.

The launch was previously delayed, having been initially set to depart on Oct. 30th, 2021. The delay occurred because of minor health issues and bad weather on the Atlantic Ocean. The ocean's conditions are vital to the launch in case of emergency landings. The ocean must be calm so the crew have a viable option for a mid-flight splashdown. While they may have been delayed once, the 4-person crew persevered with the mission on Wednesday. Of the 4-man crew are 3 Americans and a German. Members Tom Marshburn, Kayla Barron, Raja Chari, and Mathias

Maurer were aboard the Crew-3. Marshburn will be serving as the Crew-3's pilot, and has been a NASA astronaut since 2004. He has flown various missions before, including the Russian Soyuz spacecraft. But the crew was far from the only aspect of the mission.

The Crew-3 mission was flown in the spacecraft the Crew Dragon Endurance. The Crew Dragon was built under NASA's Commercial Crew Program, which gave the company 3.1 billion in order to assist funding for the launch of 6 missions. With the correct aid, courage, and perseverance, Crew-3 launched through the atmosphere and to the ISS. The crew will stay in orbit for 6 months on their science and research mission.
