Equestrian Team Reins Over All Other Teams

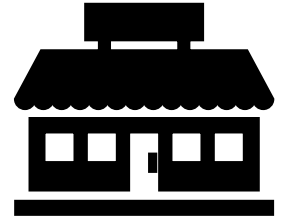
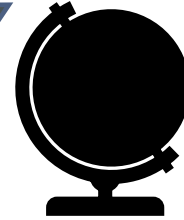

Q: Are you looking forward to trying or doing anything special during your stay?

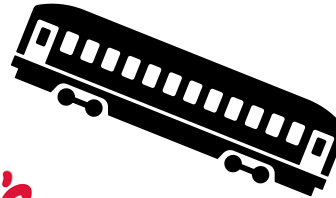
A: I want to go to Chicago and NYC and I also want to try Tennis and more American food.

With his identity subsequently revealed, and his name villainized, Peter Parker and Spiderman alike became public enemy number 1. Picking up directly after FFH ended, No Way Home continued Spiderman's story in a way that no one expected. Since the announcement of the 3rd MCU Spiderman movie, concepts of how said movie would proceed were abound. Speculations only seemed to escalate upon the release of various teasers.

On December 17, 2021, the movie finally released. Fan's flocked to theaters to see No Way Home, and talk about the movie has been astounding. No Way Home is currently the 12th highest grossing movie globally.

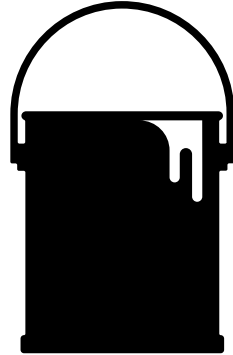

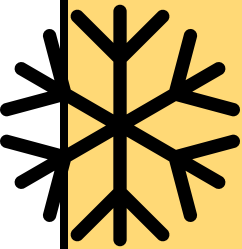

Nonfiction:

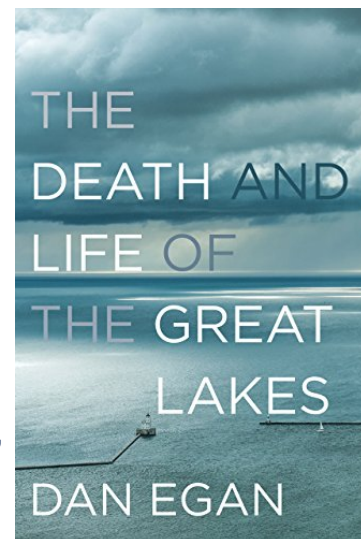
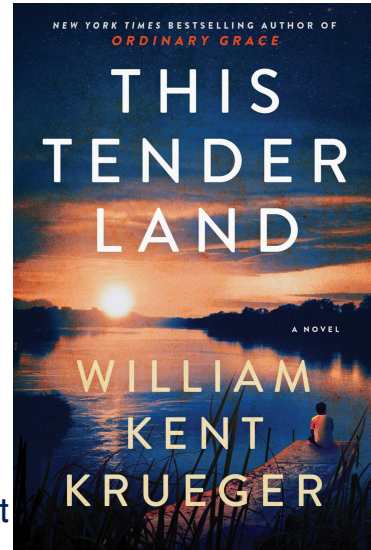

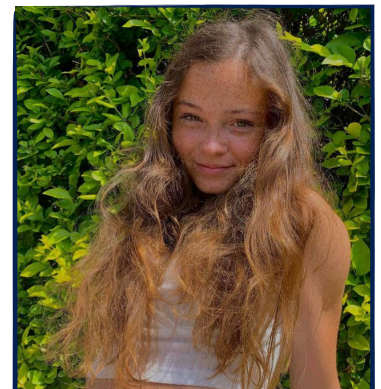
