


Skiing Their Way To State

Many winter sports are finally coming to an end, and that includes our boy's swim team. Their final conference meet took place on Friday and Saturday, the 25th and 26th of February. The meet that took place on Friday was in order to qualify for the conference finals on Saturday. If the swimmers were able to place in the top eight, then points were scored for the team. To say our boys were successful would be an understatement. The team ended their season on a high note, as they placed first overall. The final score ended with 531 points for Manistee, 477 points for Ludington, and 240 points for Freemont. Not only did the boys place first, but they also broke a record for the 400 freestyle relay, with a pool record of 3 minutes and 22 seconds flat. The previous record was set by Springhill, who is no longer in the same conference.

Although the season may be over for some swimmers, it is not over for everyone. Swim team members **Seth Thompson (12)**, **Alec Lampen (10)**, **Drew Mendians (10)**, and **Trevor Adamczak (11)** will participate in the state meet that will take place in a couple of weeks.State qualifier Drew Mendians states that "the meet went well for everyone that swam! Mask Mandate Update

As Covid-19 cases are finally beginning to slow their roll, the need for masks becomes up in the air. Michigan has seen the best statistics since October with fewer than 2,000 patients with Covid hospitalized. Many health experts are optimistic, and believe that the state is in it's recovery phase. Because of this, Governor Gretchen Whitmer has recently discontinued the recommendation for wearing masks in many indoor settings. This brings up numerous questions, specifically in how this will affect the schools. Counties such as Wayne, Oakland, and Washtenaw, who have enforced mask mandates this school year, have plans to drop their regulations in the coming weeks. As for Manistee County, some schools have not implemented a mask regulation, and have left it up to the students to make their own decision. For Manistee High School, the decision regarding masks will most likely be discussed by the school board in the next couple of days. If the mask requirement was to be lifted, it would definitely be an adjustment, since masks have been a rule for the past two years. People are already beginning to wear masks less at indoor sporting events and other school-wide activities. Of course each school will have to make the decision based upon what is best for the students and faculty at the time, and how prevalent covid is at the school district.

The Festival performance will be followed by a performance for the high school band at Eastern Michigan University. The opportunity will allow the band to perform and receive criticism at the university, but without a rating.



Russia Ukraine Tensions: Tensions between Russia and Ukraine have not been hidden.
