The team recently partook in the State meet on the 11th and 12th of March at Calvin University. Swimmers Alec Lampen (10), Seth Thompson (12), Drew Mendians (12), and Trevor Adamczek (11) (with Tug Thuemmel (11) as alternate) represented the Manistee Chips that day. Out of the 37 teams from all over Michigan, Manistee's own placed 8th overall with an end score of 98 points. With only four swimmers, this is an extremely impressive accomplishment. Two of the three relays- the medley and the 200 free- placed 6th place overall, and the third relay- the 400 free- placed 9th.

Michigan's Tornado Drill March 23rd

As we have stepped into spring, that means all the rain and storms are coming as well. So it's always better to be prepared than to be unsure in any of these types of situations. The Michigan State Police Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division is calling on a voluntary statewide tornado drill at 1 p.m. on March 23rd. To listen in on this drill, turn on National Oceanic, or Atmospheric Administration radio or T.V. station.

Michigan has an average of 15 tornadoes each year, so it's better to have a plan for if one touches down in your area. So know the facts on tornadoes;

You should know that tornado watch means that the weather could lead up to one, while tornado warning means that one has been sighted or indicated. When a tornado is approaching the sky will be dark and greenish, there is often large hail, and lots of fog.

Make sure that everyone within the household is aware of the safety plan, they know where to go and how to get there. Have supplies ready just in case of an emergency, and turn on radios when big storms are heading your way.


The Production of Willy Wonka Jr.


