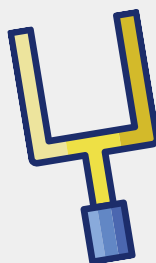


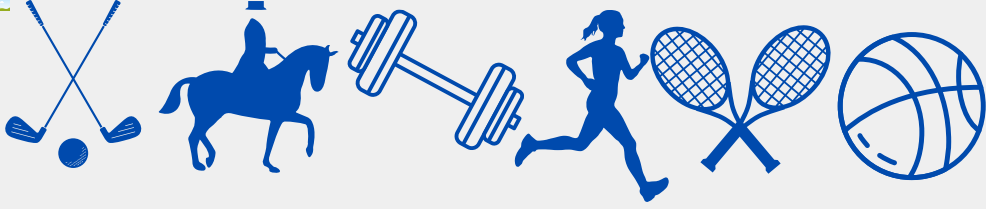
FOOTBALL FEAT

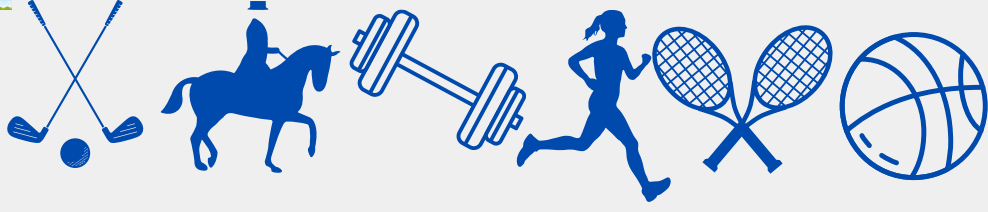
WRAPPING UP XC

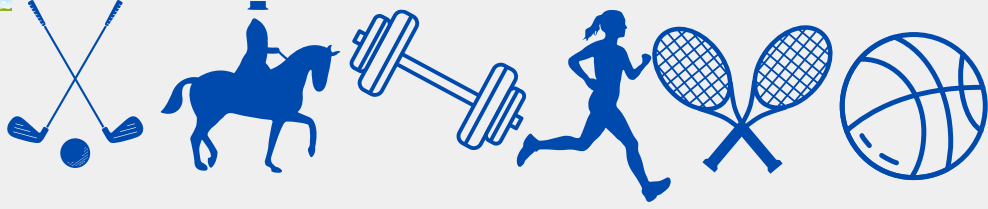

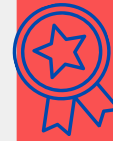

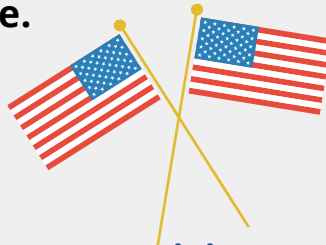
Question 1: Where are you from?

- Because it has a really different culture compared to the Italian one.



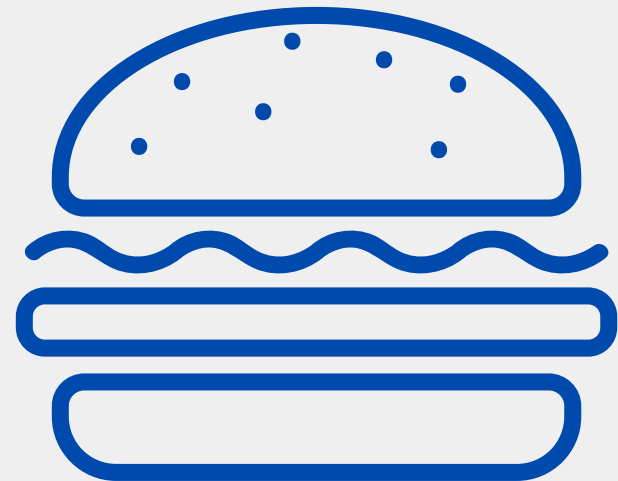
Question 3: What activities do you participate in? If any.

- In Italy we have one class with the same people and the same classes for five years, only the teachers change

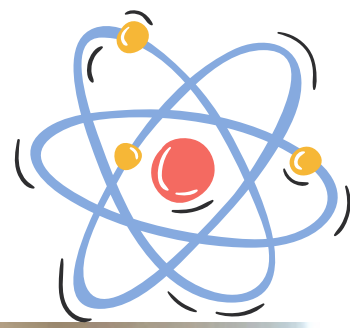
"CAUGHT IN THE ACT" - A NIGHT OF FARCE

The department is now preparing for its spring musical, Beauty and the Beast. Auditions are on November 29 and 30 from 3:30 to 6.

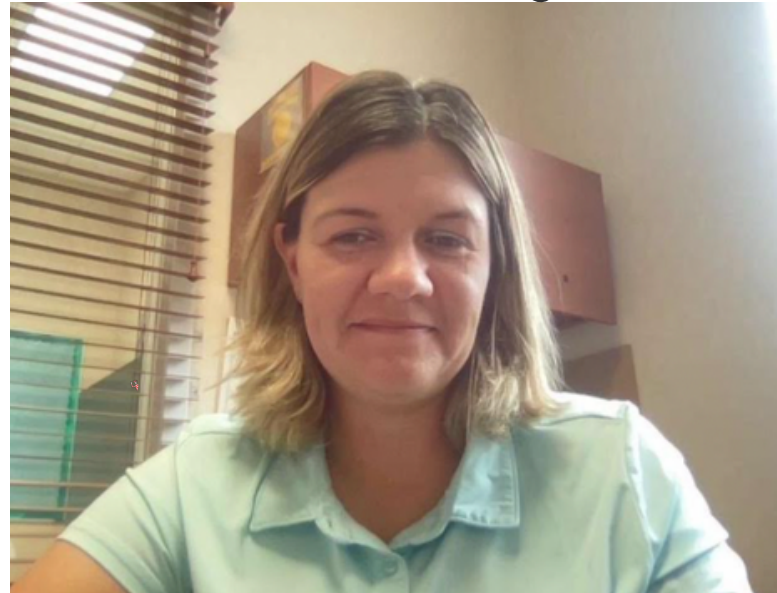




DEAN OF STUDENTS POSITION FILLED BY MS. WARNKE

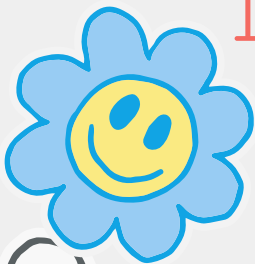
