Early this year students were invited to apply for a Student Advisory Committee which would help in the process of choosing a new mascot. With only 8 students applying, all got in.

The process started with a community forum. Members of the community were invited to a presentation given by Mr. Stoneman about what the process was going to look like from start to finish with a general timeline.

From there, the Student Advisory Committee met to establish the criteria for the upcoming submissions. They decided that the mascot must:

- Represent the history, culture, and values of the district and community
- Be a positive symbol that represents all aspects of MAPS academics, athletics, and community pride
- Be respectful to any living culture

With these things in mind, the community was encouraged to submit ideas of their own. There were nearly 300 submissions at the end.

November 18th was the first time the submissions were reviewed. However, the submitting period didn't end until December 16th. On the 19th, the committee reviewed all of the submissions and chose recommended finalists based on the before decided criteria.

Adding a student voice to the new mascot decision was a priority of both the MAPS Board of Education and the Student Success Committee, which is a group that includes several board members. In the end, the student committee created a list of 6 options, and communicated their top 3 choices to the student success committee. From there, the student success committee chose a final 2 options from the 6 to be presented to the board.

On Monday, January 30th, the student success committee recommended **Mariners and Whitecaps** to the MAPS Board of Education as their choices for a public vote.





#### NATURAL NHS CHAPTER

This year **Dylan Madsen** is leading the NHS chapter project. Unlike some chapter projects in the past, Dylan's idea will have long lasting effects and a direct impact on students at MHS. He proposed NHS invest in converting the standard short-grass outside the High School English Department into a longer-grass native grassland.

In theory this is a similar project to the prairie area already established behind the science department. The key difference is that the NHS grassland will include lots of native flowers, in hopes it will add a pretty sight out our windows.

Reaching the full growth of a flowering native prairie will take awhile. First the site will have to go through a series of treatments throughout the spring and summer to kill off the existing short grasses. In the fall of 2023 NHS members will spread the mixture of native seeds that will hopefully take root in the soil. Of course, grasses and flowers don't grow overnight. This acre sized area of land will take an expected three years to mature.

You can almost hear the students of next year walking the halls and complaining "That dirt looks so ugly, what happened to the grass?" But if you take an even closer listen you may imagine students a few years from now pointing out how beautiful the flowering grasses and butterflies look out their English classroom window.

On Wednesday Jan. 11, **Madsen** represented the NHS chapter at the board meeting. After a compelling presentation he was given the OK to move ahead with this project.


