


The halls were overflowing with Halloween spirit! There was an abundance of fun, scary, and creative costumes found in every class.



The Manistee varsity cross country team traveled to Chippewa Hills to compete in the 2023 MHSAA Division 3 regional meet last Friday afternoon. Both the girl's team and the boy's team finished fifth place overall. The Mariner girls missed qualifying for the state meet by only 22 points. However, **Ceci Postma** (12) finished fifth place individually, earning herself a spot to compete in the state meet. **Jack O'Donnell** (12) placed 7th individually, also earning himself an opportunity to compete at the state meet. For the rest of the team, the regional meet marked the end of the cross-country season. **Jack and Ceci** will compete this Saturday at The Michigan International Speedway in Brooklyn, Michigan.







On Friday, October 27, the Manistee Varsity football team won their first postseason game to advance to the District Finals against Kingsley. The Mariners took on Lake City and came away with a huge win, 44-6.

It was a great win to provide momentum for their future postseason hopes. In spite of the colder weather that has come, the Mariners appeared stronger than ever.

On offense, there were several scorers including Isaiah Davis (12), who scored 2 touchdowns and rushed for a total of 96 yards. Freshman **Dayvion Neal-Berry (9)** contributed 2 touchdowns with a total of 56 rushing yards. Kaden Kott (11) and Nick Hornkohl (12) each had a touchdown apiece, with Kott hitting an important milestone as he hit 1000 rushing yards on the season.





Defensively, the Mariners were very solid and allowed just one touchdown. The defense was led by Nathan Doremus (12), who had 10 tackles on the night. Senior Caius Johns (12) recorded 3 sacks while both Hornkohl and Kott both earned themselves an interception each.

### Five Nights at Freddy's: Any Good?

I highly suggest that you get comfortable before you start reading this review, as this was such an ambitious film that I need-for the first time-two pages to explain my thoughts. As somebody who grew up on Game Theory, Markiplier, and various other YouTubers, I found this to be the full embodiment of what the younger me would've wanted a FNAF movie to be. I seriously enjoyed my time with this movie and had a fantastic time at the early screening I attended. However, after having a few days to think about it, was this film everything it should've been?

First, let's talk about the production quality of this movie. The animatronics, pizzeria, and generally everything you see is nearly perfect. Words could never describe the magic I felt seeing my childhood dreams becoming a reality. Seeing everything on "the big screen" was arguably already enough for me to enjoy the film, but there is far more to being a good film than having sensory stimuli. This film's most prominent discussion point and criticism comes from its screenplay and story, and that is what we will be covering next.

At its core, the Five Nights at Freddy's video game series has always relied on watching for animatronics and jumpscares to make for engaging gameplay. But rather than turning this into a standard horror movie, Blumhouse Productions went the ambitious route of telling the security guard's story instead. I believe that this was the best decision for the movie to make, but the execution turned out to be quite flawed and made the movie far messier than it needed to be. Here's why:

When creating a film adaptation of a video game, it's vital to maintain the integrity of what the games have already established while making changes to best suit the format of a feature film. Unfortunately, this movie struggled in both regards. It took lots of inspiration from the source material but did not manage to keep it consistent OR show it in a way that was interesting for newcomers. Where this film succeeds most is by giving longtime fans a feast of easter eggs and references, offering a variety of nods to the community, and being very satisfying for them to watch in a theatrical setting.

It would be disingenuous to act like this is a perfect film. Especially for those who don't have a decent understanding of FNAF's history, this can appear to be a complete mess of a movie. However, despite the countless flaws and plot holes within this film, it still plays out as a massive love letter to fans who have been around for the long haul. So, while I cannot claim in good faith that this is a great movie, I will say that this made no nostalgic for some of the best times I ever had growing up on the internet. I give Five Nights at Freddy's a rating of 7.5/10.









