STUDENT LIFE CONTINUTED COLIN DOES DRINKS




Colin would like to reiterate to readers that "If you find something you enjoy, then it is something worth putting effort towards."

 After graduation I'm going to go to West Shore for my first 2 years then if I can transfer to a bigger college




From January 24th to 26th, musicians **Tristan Gras (12), Jack O'Donnell (12),** and **Sarah Huber (11)** all had the opportunity of attending the prestigious MSBOA All-State event. This annual gathering is a celebration of the most distinguished musicians in the state of Michigan, where students are selected for ensembles based on their performances during a recorded audition. With approximately 2,500 people auditioning for just 400 seats across five middle and high school ensembles, the standards are high. Those who were selected meet in January for two and a half days of rehearsal with nationally recognized conductors, eventually performing the rehearsed pieces in the Devos Performance Hall. **O'Donnell** and **Huber** were both selected to be first and second chair in the High School Orchestra, the most

prestigious ensemble offered. The performance pieces were outstanding, with the orchestra delivering renditions of "Conga del Fuego Nuevo" and

"Symphony No. 5 (Shostakovich)".



For **Jack**, this marked his 5th consecutive year



participating in All-State, he exclaims; "It was a very cool experience overall and I always enjoy going down to Grand Rapids and rehearsing at the DeVos Hall. 

Despite hundreds of athletes participating in this regional competition many Mariners still had standout performances, and medaled at this meet in Mariner Gymnasium. **Isaiah Davis (12)** finished in first place in his weight class, beating the rest of his competition by over 270 pounds. **Kaden Kott (11)** also won his weight class. **Alex Aldridge (11)** also placed high in his weight class. Overall, the Mariner boys team took 5th place, out of 28 varsity teams competing.

There is a large number of teams in the area that contribute to the team, including; Onekama, Manistee, Bear Lake, Brethren, McBain, and Pine River. During the meet, each team competes in two events, Slalom and GS (Giant Slalom). The Slalom event consists of taking tight turns on a zigzag course between flags, whereas GS takes much wider turns.





The Boys secured an impressive 2nd place overall, led by captain **Luke Smith**, who placed 13th in Slalom and 18th in GS. **Luke** expressed, "The meet was great fun; we all had a good time skiing, and the snow held up better than expected. 
THINKING ABOUT SPRING SPORTS?


