MANISTEE BOYS SWIM TEAM FINDS SUCCESS AT STATE MEET!! Written by Jayna Edmondson

Alec Lampen earns All-State Honors in 2 Events!

Last week, the swim team traveled to Holland, Michigan, for the **Division 3 State Swim Championship Meet**. As a team, the Mariners collectively earned 45 points, placing 16th in the entire state. **Senior Alec Lampen** competed in the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard backstroke. Alec Lampen finished with a personal best in the 100-yard backstroke with a time of 49.83, which allowed him to place second in this event. Lampen also finished in third place in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 20.59. Lampen also competed with the relay team of **Drew Mendians (12)**, **Ajae Gouker (12)**, and **Oliver Holtgren (11)** in the 200-yard medley, finishing in 14th place overall. Mendians also



qualified to compete in the 100-yard breaststroke and finished with a season-best time of 1:00.42, which earned him 11th place.



This meet marked the end of the swim season for the Mariners, as well as the end of a swimming career for **four seniors**, including **Lampen**, **Gouker**, **Mendians**, and **Wang**. However, Lampen will continue his swimming career at the University of Kentucky next year. Wishing the best of luck to Alec next year!!

From the March 7th, 1924 edition, it reads, "greater use of the Bar Lake region by picnickers should result during the coming summer season, due to the improvements which are being made in the road leading to it." It was interesting to see how the road in question, Lakeshore Drive, was being improved to better support



different groups of people. Specific to picnickers! Ruby Madsen (9): "I just love food and the outside. I think it's so interesting that people hundred years ago loved eating as much as I do." It is great to see the differences from a hundred years ago, because if we're being honest, how often do you go picnicking? Get out and try it! Get in touch with history, and participate in an activity that some of your ancestors may have done! There are plenty of areas that would be excellent for a picnic! On March 8th, 1924, a section reads, "The Manistee High School basketball squad made basketball history for itself on Friday night (March 7th, 1924) at the Ramsdell Hall by drubbing the Traverse City Northern Michigan championship, claiming court squad 18 to 9, in the most thrilling game here in some time." This piece of history hits close to home, as our boys' basketball team (2024), just made their history, as they advanced into districts for the first time in some years! Interestingly, we can relate to history, even 100 years ago! Along with all of this "buzz" in the same edition, the Manistee High School announced that they'd be performing two Shakespearean plays. Along with the senior selected play The Arrival of Kitty, they decided to add on Twelfth Night by Shakspeare. It was announced that they'd be performing them sometime in May. So students and NHS members got together to make the bowls that people would eat out of and then take home. The fundraiser will consist of soup, bread, dessert, and of course, bowls.

In the first year, students will make the bowls, and NHS will provide funds to make the soup. In the second year, NHS wants to expand the project to include donated bowls from local potters and donated soups from local businesses to cut costs. The overall goal is to have a self-sustaining fundraiser, meaning that there will be plenty of money to make a donation. Overall, NHS members enjoyed getting together and making bowls for the fundraiser.

What are you excited to do before you graduate in the spring?




















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
