THE BOYS ARE BACK!

A winless streak of **17 years** in district play isn't a good statistic to have behind a program coming into districts. While most teams would cower behind such a stat, the Mariners boys team became motivated by it. They wanted to be the team to end the drought and signal a change in the tide of the basketball program. They came into their district game against a 16 and 6 Big Rapids with a 10 and 12 record, their best in the past decade. The seniors on the team, **Grayson Prince (12), Austen Halcome (12), Mason Gunnett (12), Jaret Edmondson (12), Isaiah Davis (12),** and **Jacob Scharp (12)** had never seen a Manistee basketball team win a game in their entire life. They didn't want their



season to end, just as the 17 years before they had, in a loss in the first round.
As the game began, the boys jumped out to an 11-0 lead, holding Big Rapids
scoreless for almost the entire first quarter, spearheaded by tough defense and a
domination of the offensive and defensive boards. As soon as the boys took the lead,
they never looked back. Big Rapids never led the entire game; the closest Big Rapids cut
the lead to was 4 in the second quarter. The Mariner's leading scorers included Landin
Sowa (10) with 15 points, Kaden Kott (11) with 14 points, and Jacob Scharp (12) with
13 points. The game finished 45-32 in favor of the Mariners, ending the 17-year winless
drought in the postseason.

He has had a very successful coaching career at Manistee High School, finishing his final season here with a record of 8-3 and tied for second in the West Michigan Lakes



Conference. Some especially exciting wins this season included defeating Ludington during the homecoming game and beating Lake City in the first round of the playoffs. Along with football, Bytwork also coached powerlifting and built a lifting program for many athletes during an extreme fitness class. Coach Bytwork states, "I certainly did not realize the impact the football team, school, and community would have upon my life when I moved here 11 years ago. I am humbled by the induction into the Hall of Fame and I know it would not have been possible without the tremendous work put in by all the coaches and players that were a part of the program during my coaching career in Manistee."



What's one interesting fact about you?



What are you excited to do before you graduate in the spring?


 I'm excited for Apring Break and go to a WWE match.



SOCCER AT SHORELINE

In preparation for the soon-to-come soccer season, some of the MHS girl's soccer

players formed a team for an indoor league in Muskegon! The team has had 1-2 games each Sunday for the past three weekends at the <u>Shoreline Soccer Facility</u>.

While both are fun, indoor soccer has some different traits compared to outdoor. For instance, players are allowed to use the side walls to pass back to themselves. It's a handy tool on offense, yet is difficult to defend when going the other way. When using the wall to defend, players aren't allowed to use both hands. If so, this would be considered "obstruction," and the ref would call a foul. Because of the walls,



Would call a foul. Because of the walls, there are no sideline out of bounds. However, there are nets above the field, keeping players from kicking the ball too high and out of bounds. If the ball gets kicked into the net, then the opposite team who kicked it gets a dropball on the sideline. Another plus to indoor is the fact that there are no offsides. This allows players to spread the field further and to have quick counter-attacks.

Currently, the Manistee team has won 3 of their 5 games and is ranked 4th out of 10 teams. Team members include **Piper Eskridge(11)**, **Eowyn Thompson(11)**, **Aubrey Rischel(11)**, **Laura Eix(12)**, **Valerie Wagner(10)**, **Evelyn Koller(10)**, **Cece Sandberg (10)** and **Gabby Senters (10)**. Indoor tends to be a higher-scoring game, with some final scores being 10-11, 7-4, and 6-3. Striker **Reese Shively (11)** stated that "indoor soccer is such a fun way to get ready for the season. It gives you the opportunity to play any position and get out of your comfort zone. Even though it's super dirty, it's very fun, and the turf rashes just get you more excited for the real season."



HISTORY OF SAINT PATRICKS DAY!!

Saint Patrick's Day is a holiday celebrated on **March 17th** every year. It honors Saint Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland. The holiday originated in Ireland but has since spread to many other parts of the world. Saint Patrick's Day commemorates the arrival of Christianity in Ireland and the cultural heritage of the Irish people. The holiday is often associated with parades, wearing green, and celebrating Irish traditions. March 17th is a day to



enjoy Irish music and try some traditional Irish food like corned beef and cabbage! Or even a limited edition Shamrock shake from McDonald's!

For over five decades, one of the most iconic traditions associated with St. Patrick's Day is the **dyeing of the Chicago River**. Every year, on the Saturday before St. Patty's Day, over 100 pounds of dye is dumped into the Chicago River, dyeing the water green for over a week. The tradition began in 1962 when a group of plumbers used a special dye to trace illegal pollution discharges. They noticed that the dye turned the river a green color and decided to continue the tradition for St. Patrick's Day.

Fun Facts About St. Patty's Day!

- 1. Did you know that the original color associated with St. Patrick's day was actually blue? It wasn't until the 19th century that green became the popular color, thanks to Ireland's nickname "The Emerald Idle" and the color of shamrocks.
- 2. Despite Saint Patrick's Day being an Irish holiday, the first St. Patrick's Day parade was actually held in the United States! The first parade celebrating this holiday what is now St. Augustine, Florida in 1601.
- 3. Ham and cabbage were originally eaten to celebrate this holiday; however, corned beef was a much cheaper substitute for these impoverished immigrants. Irish immigrants who lived in the slums of Manhattan in the late 19th century purchased left over corned beef from ships returning from the tea trade in China.


