

DEATH OF JAMES EARL JONES

On Monday, September 9, 2024, renowned actor James Earl Jones passed away. Even though it is always heartbreaking to see such a great actor go, James spent a large portion of his formative years in Manistee County, so this loss is very personal. At the age of five, he moved to Dublin, attending Dickson Rural Agricultural School (now Brethren High School), where he eventually became class president. James also devoted time to the Ramsdell Theater, working as an actor and stage manager, fostering his love of performing.





The rest of Jones's career lasted more than 60 years, during which time he broke down barriers in representation and established himself as an acting icon. His skill crossed genres, as seen by his ground-breaking performance in "The Great White Hope" and his iconic portrayals of **Darth Vader** and **Mufasa**. He achieved EGOT status, a testament to his versatility, by winning the Emmy, Grammy, Oscars, and Tony awards.

His influence went beyond the theater and screen as he supported diversity in the arts and served as a mentor to many aspiring actors. Manistee County remembers him not only as a Hollywood legend but also as a beloved local hero who encouraged countless people to follow their dreams. SAVORING THE SUN!



If you could have dinner with any famous person (dead or alive), who would it be?





JV football has had 4 games so far this season, and are currently 1-3. They played a hard game against Oakridge, but ended up losing 49-0. But, when they traveled down to Muskegon Orchard View, they came out winning the game 22-0. This being their first win of the season. Their touchdowns were scored by Hudson Cole (9), Morgan Binicki (9), and Caleb Thompson(9). Their next game at Whitehall.

Our Varsity football team has also had 4 games thus far this season. They are currently 3-1! Against Oakridge, they had a tough loss, 49-22. They quickly answered Oakridge's touchdown, with **Kaden Kott (12)** having an 80-yard run touchdown! Then **Dayvion Neal-Berry (10)** got the 2-point conversion. This put the Mariners ahead 8-7. However, the half ended 21-8, with Oakridge leading. In the 4th quarter, down by 41, **Wyatt Protasiewicz (10)** scored on a 14 yard run. **Josh Weiss (11)** added to the score with an 80 yard run. Weiss also led the team in rushes with 109 yards for eight carries, then Kott had six carries for 92 yards, and Protasiewicz had 57 yards. Defensively, **Trevor Haag (12)** led with 10 tackles, then **Ean Guenthardt (10)** and Neal-Berry both had 7, and **Landin**

Sowa (11) with 6.

Their next game against Orchard View turned out with a win, 41-0. Our touchdowns were scored by Sowa, Kott, Weiss, Protasiewicz, and **Braylen Zimmerman (11)**. Neal-Berry completed 6-of-8 passes for 124 yards. Defensively, Guenthardt led with 11 tackles. He was followed



by Sowa with 8 tackles and **Brayden Schweitzer (11)** had 5 and a tackle for a loss! Their next game will be against Whitehall at Whitehall!
