Are you enjoying America?


 Yes, because I'm having new experiences, growing as a person, and trying a new language every day.

 After high school, I plan on immediately going to college. I'm unsure where exactly I'm going to go, but I'm excited.


How have you grown as a person over your high school years?

Joker: Folie à Deux - Does Anything Matter Anymore?

Thanks to our fantastic editor (read the credits, darn it!), I stayed up all night writing this to bring you the world's quickest Vogue-to-Chronicle movie review! I watched Joker (2019) when it first came to the Vogue Theatre--even before I moved to Manistee--and I can credit it as a significant reason why I began to love watching movies! Unfortunately, its strange musical-thriller successor has proven to be less than desirable. Here's why.

The entire film follows the prison life and trial of Arthur, who took on the persona of "Joker" and murdered several "crooked" people. Along the way, he meets an obsessed fan named Harley (Quinn), and a romance quickly transpires between them. It's far less ambitious than the sociopolitical commentary of the original, but generally an intriguing storyline! However, much of the story is interrupted by musical moments



that neither progress the story nor serve as entertainment. There are about a dozen musical moments in this film, and it gets repetitive quickly.

Mediocre musical moments would be forgivable, except this movie rides so heavily on them that it appears to have forgotten to include any depth! It doesn't introduce new ideas, and almost all of its content is incredibly depressing as Joker's unfortunate circumstances and backstory haunt him and cause him to question whether his life is worth living. However, this film partially redeems itself through its fantastic acting (as expected) and a shocking ending that (for me) rivals the infamous Murray scene from the original.

It pains me to see such a rough execution of what should've been a fantastic movie, but it's certainly an easy watch for anybody who loved its predecessor! I give **Joker: Folie à Deux** a rating of **5.5/10**. See you all next week for Transformers One!


