
Jefferson Families,


Thank you for your continued partnership in helping our students succeed and grow. Together, we can make this a wonderful and impactful year!

"He would always pick a toy car, and I would pick an educational workbook." McAnn laughs, remembering how she would teach her brother everything in her workbook—whether he wanted to learn it or not. "I was always drawn to teaching and helping others learn," she says, a spark of nostalgia in her eyes.

Now, after 31 years in the classroom, McAnn's passion for teaching has only grown stronger. "My favorite subject to teach in second grade is math," she shares enthusiastically. "I love teaching different strategies, and I encourage my students to pick and choose which strategies work best for them." Over the course of her career, McAnn has taught in both the KND school district and MAPS, where she's currently in her seventh year. "This is my 31st year of teaching," she says proudly. "I spent 24 years in KND and now I'm loving my time at MAPS. What keeps me going is knowing that I'm making a difference in my students' lives and their education. Plus, the hugs are free!"

While McAnn still loves many aspects of teaching, it's the impact she has on her students that keeps her motivated. "The best part of teaching is making a difference in the lives of little ones. It's so rewarding to know that I'm helping shape their future," she reflects.

Outside of the classroom, McAnn has a variety of hobbies that keep her busy. "In the summer, I love to float down the river in my kayak with my mom. It's one of my favorite activities." She also enjoys walking and spending time outdoors when she can.
